

Edward Lehman attends the U.S. Embassy's Independence Day celebration in China on Invitation

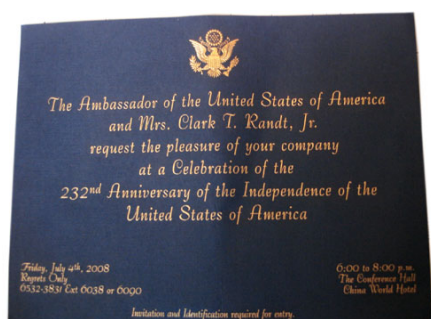
